1. God's power is sufficient in suffering (1:6-14)

"For the Spirit God gave us does not make us timid, but gives us power, love and self-discipline" (v.7)

"God's word is not chained. Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, that they too may obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory." (v.9-10)
